## PROCESSING CASES: THE U.S. SUPREME COURT Occurs throughout term Occurs throughout term **Court receives request for review** Cases are docketed (8000 per year) -Original docket (cases -Appeals (e.g. suit under Civil Rts or Voting coming under its original Rts Acts) jurisdiction) -Certification (requests by lower courts for -appellate docket (all Answers to legal questions) other cases) Petitions for writ of certiorari (most Common request for review) Requests for original review Occurs throughout term **Fridays** Justices review docketed cases -Chief justice, in consultation w/ associate justices and their staffs, prepare discussion lists (approximately one-Conferences -Selection of cases for quarter of docketed cases -Chief justice circulates discussion lists review, for denial of review prior to conferences -Rule of Four: four or more justices must agree to review **Begins Mondays after Conferences** most cases Announcement of Action on Cases **Clerk Sets Date for Oral Argument** -Usually not less than three months **Attorneys File Briefs** after the Court has granted review -Appellant must file w/in 45 days from Court-granted review -Appellee must file w/in 30 days of receipt of appellant's brief Seven Two-Week Sessions, from Wednesday Afternoons, Fridays October through April on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays Conferences -Discussion of cases **Oral Arguments** -Tentative votes -Court typically hears four cases per day, w/ each case receiving one **Drafting and Circulation of Opinions** hour of Court's time **Reporting of Opinions** -U.S. Reports (U.S.) official reporter system **Assignment of Majority** -Lawyer's Edition (L.Ed.) **Opinion Writing** -Supreme Court Reporter (S.Ct.)West **Publishing** -U.S. Law Week (U.S.L.W.) -electronic systems (Westlaw, Lexis) -Legal Information Institute Issuing and Announcing of
